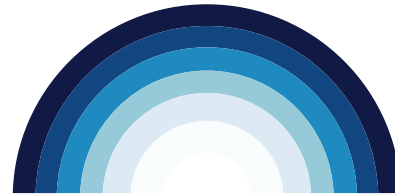

Since 2005, the Greater New Orleans Foundation has built a track record of making impactful grants after a disaster. In the aftermath of Hurricane Katrina, we created a \$23 million housing recovery fund and helped bring more than 9,000 families home.

Our homegrown experience has taught us the importance of mobilizing quickly to address immediate needs and the importance of long-term investments to support rebuilding over time. We have responded to the BP Oil Spill, Hurricane Rita, the August 2016 Floods, February 2017 Tornadoes in New Orleans East, and the 2017 Hurricane Season with Harvey, Irma, and Maria.

However, we also recognize that we are in a position of strength given our experience recovering from disasters and our growing body of knowledge of how to live better with water, mitigate hard, and build for resiliency.

How The Fund Helps

Through the Greater New Orleans Foundation Disaster Response and Restoration Fund, we mobilize and support a network of voluntary organizations active in disasters (VOADS) across our region whose expertise is deployed locally, nationally, and internationally. We coordinate with other funders and local governments. Our goal is to get the support where it is needed, to the most vulnerable citizens and help those communities develop meaningful civic engagement in designing the future of their communities as they rebuild.

Our Strategy

The fund prioritizes the 13-Parish region of Southeast Louisiana. However, we continue to honor the tradition of “paying it forward” and helping our neighbors and other communities impacted by a disaster. We partner with community foundations across the country to direct dollars to efforts on the ground.

IMMEDIATE

Basic needs such as food, clothing, shelter, and deployment of volunteer responders.

SHORT TERM

Rebuilding efforts, clean-up, technical assistance of community foundations and funders, information-sharing, monitoring, and assessment of long-term rebuilding needs.

LONG-TERM

Mental health support, technical support for disadvantaged businesses, legal services, community engagement, and advocacy.
